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About the Sheffield Local Offer

The **Sheffield Local Offer** is part of the **Sheffield Directory**. It provides information and services for:

- Children and young people aged 0–25 with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND)
- Parents and carers
- Professionals and organisations supporting families

You can access the Local Offer on computers, smartphones and tablets. It includes:

- Services and advice provided by **Sheffield City Council**
- Services and advice from the **NHS and health services**
- Services offered by the **voluntary and private sectors**

What Does It Help With?

The Local Offer provides advice to help young people make informed choices about:

- Where to live
- Transport
- Social activities
- Work and training
- Preparation for adulthood



Who Is It For?

- Parents and carers of children and young people with SEND
- Young people themselves
- Individuals, groups, and organisations working to support families

It also highlights other resources, services, and guidance.



Supports SEND Logo

Look for the Supports SEND logo when searching in the Sheffield Directory. This means the service is approved by Sheffield City Council or the NHS for children and young people with SEND.

We understand that not everyone has regular internet access. If you're a parent, carer, or young person there are other ways to get information from Sheffield's Local Offer.

Call for Support

You can contact Sheffield City Council. They can give you information over the phone or send printed information by post.

Visit Your Local Library or Family Hub

Most Sheffield libraries and Family Hubs offer free internet access and staff who can help you search on the SEND Local Offer website or print out information for you.

- Find your nearest library: Call 0114 273 4567 or ask at your local community centre.
- Family Hubs also offer support and may have printed resources available.

Ask a Professional

If you're working with a school SENCO, health visitor, social worker, or support worker, they can help you find the information you need. They may be able to print out sections of the Local Offer or explain services available.

Ask for Printed Copies

If you need printed information about services, support, or guidance from the SEND Local Offer, you can ask for this by phone or **E-mail** (see contact details above). Let them know what information you're interested in (e.g., education, transport, short breaks), and they'll send you the printed information.

You can contact any of the above to ask them to print any of the information and websites mentioned in this booklet.



What is SEND?

SEND stands for **Special Educational Needs and Disabilities**. A child or young person may have SEND if learning is harder for them than for most children their age.

This can include difficulties with:

- Reading, writing, or number work
- Expressing themselves or understanding others
- Making friends or relating to adults
- Managing emotions or behaviour
- Seeing, hearing, or moving around
- Medical conditions that affect learning
- Mental health difficulties (e.g. anxiety or depression)



Not all children with SEND have a formal diagnosis. Support is based on **need**, not diagnosis.

Education and Learning

This section explains the support for children and young people with SEND in early years, school, and college. It includes information about SEN Support, EHC plans, and specialist help.

Identifying SEND in Early Years

Some disabilities are identified at birth or even during pregnancy. If a child has a significant and complex need, the **Portage Team** may become involved early to provide support and advice at home.

Other needs may not be apparent until later. Parents are often the first to notice developmental delays— such as not crawling, talking, or walking at expected ages. If concerned, parents should speak to their **health visitor, GP, or childcare provider**.

Routine Assessments

- New Baby Review (10–14 days)
- 6–8 week assessment
- 1-year assessment (9–12 months)
- 2 to 2½ year review
- EYFS progress check (2–3 years)
- Two-Year Integrated Review



You don't need to wait for an assessment to raise concerns.

Getting Help and Support

Support is available through the **Early Years Partnership**, which includes:

- Early Years Prevention Workers
- Groups and activities
- Referrals to the 0–5 SEND Team
- Advice and guidance



Referrals can be made by parents or professionals (e.g. health visitors, midwives, nurseries, GPs).

School Readiness Transition Pathway

Children needing extra help for school readiness may be supported through this pathway.

A **keyworker** coordinates services and ensures timely access to support. This includes:

- Nursery and Foundation Stage 2 engagement
- Attendance support
- Extended Support Plans/My Plans

Specialist keyworkers from services like Hearing Impaired, Visually Impaired, or Autism and Social Communication teams may also be involved.

The Graduated Approach

Schools use a **Graduated Approach** to support a child. This helps to work out any SEND needs and give the right help. This involves four stages:

1. **Assess** – what are the child's needs
2. **Plan** – what support will help? What are the goals?
3. **Do** – put the support in place
4. **Review** – did it work? What next?



This is repeated to make the support better and help a child make progress.

Identification of SEND in Schools

Schools use lots of tools and observations to identify SEND. This includes:

- Teacher assessments
- Talking to parents and getting their views
- Specialist advice (for example, Educational Psychologists)
- Looking at progress and behaviour

If a child still needs more help, the school may ask for advice from specialists or request an EHC needs assessment.

Locality Support

Sheffield has **seven school localities**. Each locality provides advice and support to schools and SENCOs for children with complex needs.

Locality support includes:

- **Stage 1 Meetings:** Look at and review Extended Support Plans
- **Stage 2 Meetings:** Look at EHC needs assessment requests

These meetings involve SENCOs, Educational Psychologists, Autism Teachers and SEND Statutory Assessment and Review Service (SENDSARS).

Contact details for the Educational Psychology Service, Autism Social Communication Education and Training Service (ASCETS) and SENDSARS are under the "Services that Support SEND that are commissioned by Sheffield City Council or Sheffield NHS" section. This is at the end of this booklet.



Sheffield Support Grid (SSG)

The **SSG** is a tool used by schools to identify and provide appropriate support for children with SEND. It ensures consistency across settings.

It covers four areas of need:

- **Communication and Interaction**
- **Cognition and Learning**
- **Social, Emotional and Mental Health**
- **Sensory or Physical Needs**



There are five levels of support:

- **Levels 1–2:** Support schools can provide independently (Ordinarily Available Toolkit)
- **Levels 3–5:** Support requiring external services or funding

Parents are encouraged to:

- Discuss their child's needs with the school
- Ask what level their child is on and why
- Be involved in planning and reviewing support



If parents disagree with the level or support, they can:

- Speak to the SENCO or leadership team
- Contact **Sheffield SENDIAS**
- Use the school's complaints process

A parent guide has been put together. Ask someone in a Family hub, Library or school to make a booklet and print it out for you.

Choosing a School for Your Child with SEND

When choosing a school for a child with special educational needs or disabilities (SEND), consider the following steps:

- **Do your research:** Visit the school's website to learn about its ethos, SEN policy, and Ofsted report.
- **Visit the school:** Arrange a visit to see how the school supports children with SEND.
- **Talk to other parents:** Their experiences can help you understand what to expect.
- **Check transition support:** If your child is moving between schools, look at the Sheffield Transition Core Principles.

Different Types of School Placement

There are three main types of school placements in Sheffield. You can find these on the Sheffield Directory. Ask someone in a Family hub, Library or school to help you search for them.

1. Mainstream Schools

Most children with SEND, including those with an Education, Health and Care (EHC) Plan, attend mainstream schools. These schools provide support through SENCOs and tailored interventions.

2. Integrated Resources (IRs)

These are specialist units within mainstream schools for children with more complex needs. Placement requires an EHC Plan. IRs support a range of needs including:

- Communication and Interaction
- Autism
- Deafness
- Physical Difficulties
- Learning Difficulties
- Speech and Language Needs



3. Special Schools

These schools cater specifically for children with significant and complex SEND. Admission is through the EHC Plan process and is based on individual needs.

Parents should always talk to the school to find out what they offer and if it's right for their child.

School Admissions for Children with SEND

Without an EHC Plan: Apply through the standard admissions process. Contact Sheffield City Council General Enquiries on 0114 273 4567 to ask for the information to be sent to you.

With an EHC Plan: Apply through the SEND Statutory Assessment and Review Service (SENDSARS) arranges placements at mainstream schools, IRs, or special schools.

You have the right to request a specific school in your child's EHC Plan. The local authority must consult with your preferred school and name it unless it's unsuitable or would impact others' education.



Key deadlines for naming a school in EHC plans for transition:

- **15 February:** For nursery to primary, infant to junior, or primary to secondary transitions.
- **31 March:** For secondary to post-16 transitions.

If you disagree with the named school, you can appeal to the SEND Tribunal. Contact SEND Statutory Assessment and Review Service (SENDSARS) on 0114 273 6394 or Sheffield SENDIAS (SSENDIAS) on 0114 273 6009 for support.



SEND Statutory Assessment and Review Service (SENDSARS)

SENDSARS is a Council service. It helps with:

- Requests for Education, Health and Care (EHC) assessments
- Writing and updating EHC plans
- Finding a school place for those with EHC plans
- Annual reviews and meetings for EHC plans
- Mediation and tribunal cases

Education, Health and Care (EHC) Plans

An EHC plan is a legal document. It explains a child or young person's needs in education, health, and social care. It also says what support they need and what goals they are working towards.

Most children with SEND do not need an EHC plan. They can be helped through **SEN Support** in school. EHC plans are for children who need more help than schools can usually give.

Who Can Ask for an EHC Needs Assessment?

You can ask for an EHC needs assessment if:

- You think your child has SEND.
- You believe they need more help than the school can give.

You can ask for an assessment if you are:

- A parent or carer
- A young person aged 16–25
- A school or college



How to Ask for an EHC Needs Assessment

If the School Is Making the Request

Schools use the **Graduated Approach** system. This means they:

- Assess your child's needs
- Plan support
- Do the work
- Review progress



They use a document called an **Extended Support Plan**. The school should try this for at least two school terms before asking for an EHC assessment.

The school sends the request to SENDSARS with:

- Evidence from the Extended Support Plan/My Plan
- Information from professionals like:
 - Educational Psychologists
 - Autism and Social Communication Team
 - Fusion SEND Hub
 - Health and social care services



Carrying out an assessment

The local authority will decide within **6 weeks** if they will do the assessment. If they say no, you can appeal. More information is in the section for Resolving Disagreements and Feedback.

If they say yes:

- They will ask for information from you, the school, and health and care professionals.
- This does not mean your child will definitely get an EHC plan.

Getting the EHC Plan

If the local authority agrees to the EHC plan:

- They will have made the decision by week 16.
- You will get a **draft plan** to read and comment on.
- You can say which school or setting you want.
- You can ask for a **Personal Budget**.

You have **15 days** to give your feedback. You can ask for more time or a meeting with an Inclusion Officer. The final EHC plan must be ready within **20 weeks** of the first request.



If You Disagree With a Decision

You can:

- Speak to SENDSARS (their details are on the previous page)
- Speak to Sheffield SENDIAS (their details are further down the booklet)
- Ask for mediation
- Appeal to the SEND Tribunal





Annual Reviews

EHC plans must be reviewed:


- **Once a year**, or
- **Every 6 months** if your child is under 5

The school or setting will arrange a meeting. You and your child can share your views. Reports must be sent out **2 weeks before** the meeting.

Transition Reviews

These help prepare for changes in school:

- Nursery to Reception: review in autumn term
- Year 2 to Year 3: review by end of Year 1 summer term
- Year 6 to Year 7: review by end of Year 5 summer term
- Year 11 to Post-16: review by end of Year 10 summer term



After the Review

The school sends a report within **2 weeks**. The local authority will decide within **4 weeks** if:

- The plan stays the same
- The plan needs changes
- The plan should end

If changes are needed, you'll get a new draft to comment on. You will have 15 days to do this.



Sheffield SENDIAS (SSENDIAS)

The **Sheffield Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Information Advice and Support Service (SSENDIAS)** is a **statutory service** that provides **free, impartial, and confidential support** to:

- **Children and young people aged 0–25** with SEND
- **Parents and carers** of children and young people with SEND

What SSENDIAS Offers

SSENDIAS helps families understand and navigate the SEND system across **education, health, and social care**. Their support includes:

- Understanding your rights under the **SEND Code of Practice**
- Advice on **Education, Health and Care (EHC) Plans**
- Help with **school placements, transitions, and appeals**
- Support during **meetings with schools or the local authority**
- Guidance on **mediation and tribunal processes**
- Help with **phased transfers and admissions**



They work closely with families to ensure their voices are heard and their children's needs are met.

Health and Wellbeing

Sheffield has many health services for children and young people with SEND. These services can help children and young people's development and mental health.

Health Services Information



Using Hospital Services

Information is available to help families navigate hospital services in Sheffield for children with SEND. It includes tips on:

- **What to expect** when visiting hospital.
- **How to prepare** your child for appointments.
- **Communicating** your child's needs
- **Support available** during hospital visits.
- **Reasonable adjustments** hospitals can make to help children with SEND feel safe and comfortable. A hospital passport can be put together that tells health staff about the child or young person's needs and how they like to be communicated to.
- **Who to contact** if you need help or have questions.

Annual Health Checks



Young people aged 14+ with a learning disability are entitled to a **free annual health check** with their GP. These checks help identify health issues early and ensure ongoing support. Contact your GP to arrange.

Paediatric Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy & Musculoskeletal Physiotherapy Out-Patient Services

Physiotherapy helps children with movement difficulties, injuries, and physical disabilities.



The musculoskeletal outpatient service supports children with joint, muscle, and bone conditions.

Children's occupational therapy helps children do everyday things that are important in their lives. These things include:

- Looking after themselves (like getting dressed or brushing teeth)
- Playing and having fun
- Being part of their family
- Making friends
- Doing well at school

The therapist works with the child and their family to help with anything that makes these things hard. They use special tools and ideas to help with how the child moves, thinks, feels, and gets along with others.

Sensory Services – Sheffield Children’s NHS



This service helps children who find it hard to deal with things like noise, touch, movement, or bright lights. These problems can make everyday things—like getting dressed, going to school, or playing—more difficult.

A team of friendly experts work with families and schools to help children feel more comfortable. They give advice, run workshops, and share ideas that can make life easier.

Audiology/ Hearing Service – Sheffield Children’s NHS

This service helps children who have trouble hearing or keeping their balance. The team checks how well children can hear and gives them hearing aids if they need them. They also help with things like buzzing in the ears or being bothered by loud sounds.

If your child has a hearing aid, the team can help with batteries, ear moulds, and fixing broken parts. They also work with schools and other services to make sure your child gets the right support.

Eye Department/Vision Impairment Service – Sheffield Children’s NHS

This service helps children with eye problems like blurry vision, lazy eye, squinting, or needing glasses. The team checks how well your child’s eyes work and helps with treatment if needed.

At your child’s appointment, their eyes will be tested by a specialist. Eye drops might be used to help the team see inside the eyes better—these drops are safe and don’t hurt. If your child needs glasses, you’ll get a prescription to take to a local optician.

The Vision Impairment Service that supports children with poor eyesight and helps families meet others in similar situations.

Early Years Therapy Team

Provides therapy for children under 5 with developmental delays, physical disabilities, or sensory needs. Services include physiotherapy, occupational therapy, and speech and language support.

Social Care

Sheffield City Council has different services to help children and young people with SEND and their families. These services aim to make life better, help children be more independent, and give carers a break.

Short Breaks



Short Breaks are activities for children and young people with SEND. They give parents or carers a break from caring. These breaks are good for both the child and the family. They help:

- Children to have fun and make friends
- Give parents and carers a rest so they can do other things like a hobby or shopping

Short Breaks can take place during the day, evening, overnight, or weekends.

Types of Short Breaks

- **Universal Activities:** Open to all children. For example, sports clubs or play schemes
- **Specialised Clubs:** Group activities for disabled children and young people
- **Befriending Services:** One-to-one support for those unable to join group activities
- **Overnight Short Breaks:**
 - **Foster Care:** Overnight stays in a family home
 - **Residential Homes:** Four homes in Sheffield offer overnight care: Gibson House, Mulberry Lodge, Rushey Meadow, and Chancet Wood
- **Direct Payments:** Monthly payments that let families arrange their own support
- **Short Break Grant:** A one-off annual payment for families who qualify to fund their own activities

Who can apply

Short Breaks are for children and young people who:

- Are aged 0–18
- Live in Sheffield
- Have a disability that makes family life much harder



The **Equality Act 2010** says a disability is a “physical or mental impairment with a substantial and long-term adverse effect on daily activities”.

How to Apply

Following assessment, a **Child in Need Meeting** is held to determine the appropriate support. If overnight care is approved, the case is referred to the Residential Team or Learning Disabilities and Difficulties Panel.



Sheffield Family Hubs and Start for Life

Family Hubs are welcoming spaces offering activities for children aged 0–5 and support for parents/carers of children aged 0–19 (or up to 25 for those with SEND). Services include:

Personal Budgets

Personal budgets are designed to give families **more choice and control** over how support is provided for children and young people with SEND. Instead of receiving services directly, families may receive an **allocated amount of money** to arrange their own support.

This money is identified by:

- **Sheffield City Council** (for education and social care)
- **Integrated Care Board (ICB)** (for health-related support)

There are **three main types of Personal Budgets**:

1. **Personal Budget for Special Educational Provision**
Linked to an **Education, Health and Care (EHC) Plan**, this budget supports educational needs. It can be requested during the EHC assessment or at annual review.
2. **Personal Health Budget**
Provided by the NHS for children eligible for **continuing healthcare** or **mental health after-care**. It can be used for treatments, equipment, or personal care.

3. **Personal Budget for Social Care (Direct Payment)**
Families can receive monthly payments to arrange their own care, including employing a **Personal Assistant (PA)** or accessing leisure activities.

How It Works



- You can receive **some or all** of the budget instead of services.
- You must agree to use the budget to meet the outcomes in your child's support plan.
- You can manage the budget yourself or nominate someone to do it.

Short Breaks: Personal budgets can be used to fund short breaks (see Social Care section).

Direct Payments: You can receive monthly payments to arrange your own support.



Preparation for Adulthood

Preparing for Adulthood is very important for young people with SEND. It helps them live independently and do well. It also helps them reach their goals and make good choices about their future.

What Is Preparation for Adulthood?

It involves planning for key life areas:

- **Education, employment and training**
- **Independent living**
- **Friends, relationships and community participation**
- **Good health and wellbeing**



Preparation should begin as **early as possible** and be a priority from Year 9 onwards. It should be discussed in **annual reviews** for those with an **Education, Health and Care (EHC) Plan**.

Who Is Responsible?

Everyone involved in a young person's life plays a role:

- Parents and carers
- Teachers and SENCOs
- Health and care professionals
- Community and voluntary sector workers



Young people should be encouraged to express their **hopes, goals, and preferences**. Their voice is central to planning.

Transition Planning

Transition planning includes:

- Exploring post-16 education options
- Accessing careers advice and work experience
- Planning for independent travel and housing
- Understanding adult health and social care services

Post-16 Education Options in Sheffield



What does “Post-16” mean?

Post-16 education refers to the learning options available after Year 11 (age 16+). These include sixth forms, colleges, specialist schools, and adult learning services. Most full-time courses involve around 16 hours of study per week, usually spread over three days. It’s important to plan how the remaining days will be used—this could include homework, volunteering, or part-time work, depending on the young person’s needs.

Planning Your Post-16 Journey: A Guide for Young People



There is a Planning Your Post-16 Journey: A Guide for Young People on the SEND Local Offer. This guide helps young people with SEND explore their education options after Year 11. It’s designed for learners working from Pre-Entry Level up to Level 2 and encourages planning with support from parents, carers, teachers, or careers advisers.



Whether you can get free travel is based on:

- Distance from school
- Ability to walk safely
- Individual needs



Having an EHC Plan does **not mean** you will always get travel support.


Independent Travel Training

This free service helps young people with SEND travel on their own. They learn to:

- Read a timetable and buy a ticket
- Stay safe on the road and on buses or trams
- Deal with changes to the journey
- Become confident

Training includes:

- Home visit to help plan the route
- One-on-one coaching
- Shadowing on the route and review meetings
- Certification at the end



Post-16 SEN Transport

Post-16 travel support is available but not automatic. Families must reapply each year. Support may include:

- Reimbursement for travel costs
- Minibus or taxi transport



There is a **yearly family cost** for transport, which may be reduced based on attendance. A **16–19 bursary** may help cover costs.

Public Transport Travel Passes

Children and young people with SEND may qualify for:

- **Zoom Zero Pass:** Free travel between home and school
- **Disabled Person's Pass:** Free travel on buses, trains, and trams
- **Disabled Persons Railcard:** 1/3 off most rail fares for a companion

If not eligible through Travel South Yorkshire, families can apply to Sheffield City Council for a letter of entitlement.

If receiving higher-rate DLA, PIP, or Attendance Allowance, a carer may travel free with the child.

Disagreement Resolution

If you disagree with a decision made by the local authority or a school regarding SEND provision, you can request **disagreement resolution**. This is a **free, voluntary, and confidential** service provided by an independent body.



It can help resolve issues such as:

- How support is provided
- Decisions about EHC assessments or plans
- School placements

Mediation

Mediation is available if you disagree with decisions about:

- EHC needs assessments
- EHC Plans
- Placement decisions
- Amendments or ceasing of a plan



You must consider mediation before appealing to a tribunal. A **mediation certificate** is required to proceed with a tribunal, even if you choose not to mediate.

Tribunal



You can appeal to the **SEND Tribunal** if you disagree with decisions about:

- EHC needs assessments
- EHC Plans
- Placement
- Amendments or cessation of a plan

Tribunals are independent and legally binding. You can represent yourself or have support from SSENDIAS or legal professionals.
